



Never Stop Dreaming (or challenging yourself)

In 2003, **Cavalía** came to a city not too far away. A small group of us carpoled two hours each way to attend, forking over almost \$100 each for mid-quality seats about halfway up from ringside. We were excited, but also a little wary. After investing so much time and expense, we really wanted our money's worth. Our expectations and standards were high.

Well, happy to say, the show did not disappoint!

I was enthralled that night, and inspired. This was the first time I'd seen a **garrocha**. A duet was performed by rider-with-pole on horseback and dancer on foot. I absorbed it into my pores, all the while thinking "*I can do that!*"

At home, I measured and cut a pole to the correct length (four meters). I set about teaching myself how to balance the heavy pole, how to switch hand-



positions (very tricky), and how to get my horse to cooperate with the whole scene (even trickier). It has been great fun (and the bruises fade over time).

All the while, I never forgot the exotic drama of that dance-duet in **Cavalía**... "*I can do that, too!*"

Early this year, I spread the word that I wish I knew a local dancer who might be interested in this novel challenge. Turns out there was such a dancer, one who had long dreamed of working with horses! Diane and I debuted our dance routine at this year's **Fiesta of the Horse**. We had a blast! A dream ten years in the making, a new challenge, some stage fright to overcome, but... *what fun!*

Many people worked hard for months getting ready for that show, choreographing and rehearsing routines, choosing music, writing scripts, and making costumes. Ages ranged from youngsters in the Clear Lake Junior Horsemen to... well, some of us are not so young anymore. Which makes the risk-taking that much more interesting, for being less expected. It is easy to sit in the stands and critique. The challenge is to overcome fear, do the work to prepare, get out there in the arena, and do your best, putting yourself on the line. I was delighted so many people stepped up to the plate, and in such creative ways.

Based on the cheers and applause, the audience was delighted, too, to see their friends and neighbors in this new light. I hope others were inspired to put together their own acts, for next year!

Never stop challenging yourself. Dreams and aspirations are not just for the young, they are also for the young at heart.

First Annual Fiesta of the Horse a Rousing Success

Medieval knights jousting, a precision mounted drill team, a flamenco dancer twirling gracefully while matching steps with a Spaniard on horseback, fine carriages pulled by adorable miniature horses, colorful gypsy horses with flowing manes and tails, a team of giant Belgian horses pulling a brightly painted freight wagon, an 1800's-era vaquero performing intricate horseback maneuvers with a dangerous looking pole, an exotic courtship duet performed on fancy-gaited Peruvian horses, an exciting re-enactment of Annie Oakley's target shooting from the back of a galloping horse...

That was the scene here in Lake County on July 1, at the Lake County Horse Council's first annual ***Fiesta of the Horse***, held at Rancho de la Fuente. "The best horse show I've ever seen in Lake County!" declared Alexandra Vidich of Highland Springs Equestrian Center.

"And it was free!" exclaimed Pat Beedle, from



Kelseyville. "This show was fantastic, and it was free!" she repeated, marveling.

The song "America the Beautiful" began the show. It is rare to see so many of the elements described in the song on display, all at one time: beautiful spacious skies, amber waves of grain, purple mountains, fruited plains... At Rancho de la Fuente the view included all that, and more.

About 200 people gathered to enjoy the performance, first of its kind in Lake County. Anyone familiar with the leisurely pace of some horse events was in for a pleasant surprise: this spectacle was action-packed and full of excitement from beginning to end. Entertainment was the goal, as well as outreach to the "non-horse" community.

Like many local residents, Carol Cole-Lewis of Lakeport usually only sees horses from a distance, grazing in pastures. "My breath was literally taken away and I was filled with a sense of excitement and anticipation when I saw so many beautiful horses performing together. I'm not a horse person, and was unaware of how many people here in Lake County are avid equine fans and the exceptional quality of their skills!" she enthused.

The festivities began with a pre-show exhibition of "quintain," or medieval martial arts, put on by the Claiche family of Kelseyville. A patriotic opening number paraded all the show participants before the audience. Joy Bennett sang the National Anthem a capella, while her sister Jocelyn dramatically carried the colors at full gallop. The theme was carried on by the red, white and blue drill team performance from the Clear Lake Junior Horsemen.

Claudia Street and Pinie Minto of the Elk Creek Buckaretttes performed to the tune of a Dave Stamey song, their working cowhorses moving in synchronized "mirror" of each other. "As a new resident of Lake County, I am impressed with the level of commitment and support of agriculture," said Claudia, who is the new Executive Director of the Lake County Farm Bureau. "Horses were an integral part of our agricultural heritage and although times and technology have changed that role, the personal connection between the human and the horse remains strong. The Fiesta of the Horse showcased that connection."

An animated Flamenco dance featuring horse, rider and dancer on foot had the audience spontaneously clapping in time. The Hooves & Wheels Club's demonstration included miniature horses, always a crowd favorite. Haunting Irish tunes introduced the audience to beautiful and rare Gypsy Vanner horses. And members of the Wine Country Peruvian Paso Horse Club performed to flute music from the Andes in traditional costume on their exotically gaited Peruvian Paso horses.

Audience member Pat Beedle was pleased to learn so much history during the show. "I never knew about Teamsters!" she exclaimed, "I guess I just never thought about where the name came from."



She learned the word's origins while watching Juan Erquiaga and his daughter Kate maneuver a team of giant Belgian horses around the arena, demonstrating backing and turns while announcer Deb Baumann asked the audience to imagine the crowded streets of old San Francisco with hundreds of wagons and horses jockeying for position along the docks where ships were being unloaded. Tremendous skill was needed to thread these huge wagons through narrow openings while handling the reins of two, four or six giant draft horses at once. Teamsters took justifiable pride in the ability to do this demanding job.

The show ended with laughter and thrills, thanks to the comedy Wild West Show reenactment staged by the Annie Oakley Players of Lake County.

The day went remarkably smoothly, for which the Horse Council credits the owners of the property and to a small army of volunteers. "The first year of any new event is always a special challenge," according to Carol Biggs, president of the Lake County Horse Council. "We thank Frank and Rosana Perez for volunteering beautiful Rancho de la Fuente and for working very hard in advance to help plan and prepare the first annual Fiesta of the Horse. The setting was spectacular! I've been overwhelmed by the positive response I'm hearing from everyone who came."

"An event this ambitious could not have been successful without large numbers of talented, hard-working people," added show producer Baumann. "Many are members of the Horse Council board, but when word got out we were doing this, other people stepped up to help, too. This was truly a community effort."

Next year, she hopes to have the show videotaped for broadcast on Lake County's local TV channel.






